





Pan-Sussex Safeguarding & Child Protection Policy & Procedures Group - Briefing for staff

The Safeguarding Children Partnerships in Brighton & Hove, West Sussex, and East Sussex meet quarterly as the Pan-Sussex Procedures Group.

This group steers the development and publication of the procedural guidance for safeguarding in all areas. Meetings usually involve updating and reviewing the Pan-Sussex Child Protection and Safeguarding Procedures regularly to ensure that they comply with Government guidelines, are accurate, and work for practitioners. The Group last met on 10 July 2020.

Historical Abuse Allegations

Organisational responses to allegations by an adult of abuse experienced as a child must be of as high a standard as a response to current abuse because:

- There is a significant likelihood that a person who abused a child(ren) in the past will have continued and may still be doing so;
- Criminal prosecution remains a possibility if sufficient evidence can be carefully collated.

This procedure has been updated to reflect the change from Safeguarding Investigation Unit to Sussex Police control room and now includes Sussex Police action if the location of the crime is not in Sussex.

Children The Criminal Injuries
Compensation Scheme is a
government-funded scheme
intended to compensate blameless
victims of violent crimes. In June
2019 the government abolished the
'same roof' rule, which blocked
victims of violent crime from
receiving compensation if the
attacker was a family member they
were living with at the time of the
incident. The pan-Sussex procedure
has been updated.

The Pan-Sussex Safeguarding and Child Protection policies and procedures will now be written using gender-neutral language.

The following procedures have been added:

Restrictive Physical Intervention
Pregnancy of a child
Reasonable punishment and
smacking

The following sections have been added to existing procedures:

<u>'Begging' to Exploitation</u> <u>'Babysitting' to Children left</u> unaccompanied by parents/carers

Surrogacy The Pan-Sussex Surrogacy policy has been reviewed and updated to reflect Department of Health guidance. The Policy provides advice on telling the child they were born through surrogacy, legal considerations, the parental order process and the surrogacy agreement.

<u>Unexplained Injuries to Young</u> Children

Physical injuries in young children may be lifethreatening or cause permanent neurological damage. Reviews highlight the fact children under 1-year-old are especially vulnerable. Any suspicious injury in a pre or non-mobile and/or pre or non-verbal child must be regarded with extreme concern. The Unexplained Injuries to Young Children procedure has been refreshed.
